## STUDENT LEADERSHIP


Back in October, a group of our Year 11 students attended the Ashton Sixth Form College student leadership conference - a day dedicated to inspiration, collaboration and personal growth.

Students discovered how leadership is built through connection, courage and authenticity.

Four exceptional keynote speakers shared their unique journeys into leadership and students then took part in interactive workshops, contributing ideas, solving challenges and working collaboratively with their peers from other schools.

The conference was a tremendous success, leaving our students feeling motivated, empowered and eager to apply their new leadership skills within school.

## YEAR 10 STEM CONFERENCE

Year 10 students from Longdendale were delighted to be invited to the XL Academy Conference: The STEM Summit, hosted at Ashton Sixth Form College in November.

The day began with icebreakers, warm-up activities and a welcome talk. Students then took part in a series of STEM taster lessons, delving into a range of fascinating and complex topics. In maths, they explored Fibonacci's sequence and discovered how number patterns can be used to solve real-world problems. In physics and computer science, they learned about atoms, black holes, coding and calculating velocity.

They heard from Martin Bryant, founder of Big Revolution, author of PreSeed Now, and editor of the Geekout social media industry newsletter. He shared his story, unpacked complex ideas and inspired our students to continue exploring the world of STEM.

## 12 DAYS OF CHRISTMAS

To celebrate the countdown to the holidays, we launched our festive 12 Days of Christmas challenge in school. The run-up to the holidays has been filled with excitement, festive spirit and plenty of opportunities for students to get involved.

Students have been aiming to maintain 100% attendance and no C2 behaviours to be in with a chance of winning fantastic prizes, including skip-the-queue lunch passes and selection boxes.

Not every event has been a competition however and many activities have simply been about spreading Christmas cheer throughout the school! Events such as our Disco Lunch, Christmas Jumper Day, Christmas Dinner and Golden Ticket assembly ensured everyone could join in the fun.

With over 500 students successfully maintaining perfect attendance and behaviour throughout the 12 days, the whole school was rewarded a Christmas quiz on the penultimate day of term.

## ICELAND SCHOOL TRIP

During the October half-term, a group of over 40 students set off on an unforgettable school trip to Iceland - a country filled with dramatic landscapes and unique natural wonders.

The adventure began with a visit to the remarkable Lava Tunnel near the capital city of Reykjavik where staff and students explored the vivid colours and rock formations carved by ancient volcanic eruptions. The first night brought a real highlight of the trip, as everyone witnessed the breathtaking Northern Lights across the Icelandic sky.

The following day the explorers travelled to Thingvellir National Park, an area that straddles the Mid-Atlantic Ridge, where the North American and Eurasian tectonic plates are drifting apart very slowly. Students walked amongst the rifts, capturing stunning photos of the dramatic scenery.

The next day, everyone explored the geothermal wonders at Geysir, the world-famous spouting hot spring that lent its name to geysers across the globe, then stopped to admire the powerful Gullfoss waterfall, one of Iceland's most spectacular natural landmarks. The day ended with an ice plunge pool challenge between students and staff and a dip in the Secret Lagoon, a naturally heated geothermal pool - the perfect way to unwind.

On the last day, the group set off for a glacier walk under clear, perfect conditions. Equipped with helmets, crampons and ice picks, the students climbed steadily across the ancient ice, eventually reaching the summit where they enjoyed breathtaking views. They even had the chance to chip away at the glacier itself, gaining a deeper understanding of its age and formation.

From there, the group continued to the dramatic Black Sand Beach, famous for its volcanic coastline. Their final stop of the day was the majestic Skógar Waterfall, where they were treated to an unforgettable sight - a double rainbow arching through the spray.

The trip was truly extraordinary from start to finish, offering students a blend of adventure, education and awe-inspiring natural beauty. A huge thank you goes to the dedicated staff team who planned, organised and led this remarkable experience. Their hard work made it possible for students to explore one of the world's most unique landscapes and create memories that will stay with them for years to come.

## OPEN EVENING

It was a pleasure to welcome over 300 local families to our annual Open Evening, held early in the autumn term. Guests learnt about the Longdendale Legacy from Mr Chiles, discovered the many advantages of being part of Stamford Park Trust and explored everything our school has to offer prospective students.

Our fantastic students led guided tours around the school and supported departments with a wide range of interactive demonstrations. Visiting families were full of praise for the Longdendale students they met throughout the evening, and we cannot thank all our volunteers enough for their contribution - each and every one of them was a true credit to our school.

Prospective students enjoyed an exciting programme of activities, from taking part in game shows in maths, to exploring rationing and evacuation in history. They also enjoyed solving the case of the missing trophy in science - a big well done to Lucy, Willow and Orla, whose excellent powers of observation and deduction helped them identify the culprit and win the science department's prize draw. Many visitors also impressed us with their efforts in our Golden Legacy Builder challenge throughout the night; well done to Riley who won the top prize of an Amazon Kindle in our prize draw and Alfie, Esme, Willow and Eleanor who all won book tokens.

Meanwhile, our current students demonstrated their exceptional talents with outstanding performances in music, drama and dance, all of which were thoroughly enjoyed by our visitors.
